Items discussed were:

1. Minutes of the April meeting were approved with the following correction. New York State has a 1:3 apprentice ratio not 3:1.
2. John Rossi and the number of permits he has pulled and how he can do all of these projects by himself. The Workers Compensation Board is checking into this. Inspections of his work will also be looked at.
3. The Electrical Board approved the application of Tom McIntosh to replace Bryan Jackson on the Electrical Board.
4. Charles Joslyn asked if there were any recommendations for changes to Part II of the City exam.
5. Chris Evans and Steve Kisloski will be sent letters explaining how to renew their journeyman's license.
6. The request from Tim Rawleigh for a Masters Class C was denied.
7. The request from Mark Williams to change his Masters Class C to a Masters Class A or B was denied.
8. Justin DiRose, Caleb Nelson, Erik Nelson, and John Perry were approved to take the journeyman's test last year and will be added to take the test in May.
9. Fire Alarm licensing.
10. The New York State Department of Labor is accepting comments on the application of Jamba Electric for an Apprenticeship Program. The Electric Board feels this application should be denied for the following reasons.
 - Jamba Electric has been in business for 15 years with no employees other than the owner.
 - Jamba Electric needed apprentices for a job in the City of Binghamton who per City Code need to be in a New York State approved Apprenticeship Program. Jamba Electric knew this when he started the job in November of 2013 and waited until April of 2014 to apply for an apprenticeship program.
 - The pay rates listed on the application do not match up with what the apprentices are currently being paid. They are being paid less than that which is listed on the application.
 - One of the candidates has since left the employment of Jamba Electric.

- Jamba Electric has never done a project of this size and there is a good chance when this job is finished the prospect of future employment for his current employees is in question.

There being no further business before this Board a motion was made to adjourn at 11:25am.
